ANZAC Day Brisbane 2021 update...

Hello all,

I sent an email out earlier regarding ANZAC Day 2021 in Brisbane and the proposed format it may take. Just to give you an update on the meeting held on 10 Nov 20.

It went as I expected it too with some having their knickers in a twist about the proposal. I must admit

I thought similar until the meeting where it was explained a bit better.

Brisbane ANZAC Day 2021 is being currently planned in line with the **CURRENT** QLD Govt COVID

restrictions as at 1 Oct 2020. They cannot plan on anything else until this changes.

If they planned to hold ANZAC Day as normal they could not control the crowds that would attend. As the march was cancelled in 2020, it was assumed that more would attend next year. Also if COVID ramped up again in 2021 then they would have to cancel it once again and run the risk of not having

an alternate plan; as well as frustrating a lot of people who planned to attend.

The main reason for the decision to hold the parade at the RNA showgrounds is that in line with the current COVID restrictions, the committee can control the attendees and therefore ensure their

safety as much as possible while restricting spectators and those marching. Emphasis on this is

the older veterans and trying to reduce the risk for them as well as everyone else.

At this stage if COVID restrictions are reduced in the future - their plan has some wiggle room in it to increase the numbers who participate and who spectate but that would be limited to veterans and

associations but not civilians who normally line the street.

Currently numbers are based on banner carriers and two people per association / entity to spectate. They have also capped numbers of current serving RAAF, NAVY and ARMY who will march.

Keep in mind the planning for ANZAC Day is no small task and the amount of documentation that has to be compiled and submitted for approval must address and align with certain restrictions and parameters of the QLD Govt.

Whilst not dealt with at the meeting a question was raised about a Dawn Service and it is perceived that this too would be (at the moment) a restricted event.

Although disappointing for those who normally march I guess we have to roll with what the organisers can control. Of course we would all love to march or to spectate but at the moment they have to work with what they have.

More to follow next meeting on 9 Feb which I will also attend as well.

Amalgamation of the six Battalions

On researching some old Kapyong Kronicals, (a 3RAR newsletter produced monthly in the 1970s), in the 3RAR museum I came across this article, which I hope you all may find interesting....

Appearing in a 1974 issue and titled,

ALL YOU WANTED TO KNOW THE AMALGAMATION OF 2/4RAR 5/7RAR 8/9RAR

A direction was given to reduce the RAR from nine to six Battalions, as part of the reduction of the Army to a target strength of 34,000.

This was done by linking six Battalions to form three linked Battalions, 2/4RAR, 5/7RAR, 8/9RAR.


It was intended that, in the implementation of linking procedures, Battalions be treated on an equal basis. However, should an area of contention arise where competing claims were, in all other respects, equal, preference of desire or priority should be with the older Battalion.

Birthdays

The birthdays of all Battalions linked will continue to be recognised for the purpose of the exchange of greetings. However, it was reasonable that only one official celebration for each linked Battalion take place annually. It seemed appropriate; therefore, the birthday of both Battalions be celebrated on the anniversary of the official date of linking.

Colours

Since the linking is a temporary measure, both sets of Regimental Queens Colours were retained in use and paraded together on appropriate occasions.

Flags

A Unit flag is an important focal point in a Battalion. New flags were required for linked Battalions. Two changes were proposed in the new design. The flag is divided diagonally by a line from the upper left corner to the lower right. The colour of the oldest (lowest number) Battalion is on that half of the flag pole, and the colour of the second Battalion on that half above the diagonal. The designation of the linked Battalion will appear in the upper hoist canton. For example



<u>Lanyards</u>

It was proposed to seek approval for a new lanyard incorporating both colours of the Battalions linked. This will take time to produce, if approved. In the meantime, the simplest, fairest, and most practical solution was to wear a combined lanyard of both Battalions, neatly stitched together by the Unit tailor in such a manner that the stitches did not show. For uniformity, the lanyard of the older Battalion, when on the shoulder, is on the outside nearest the sleeve.

Mascots

Quintus, the mascot of 5RAR, was taken on strength 5/7RAR. Similarly, Private John Macarthur 1, 9RAR's mascot, was taken on strength 8/9RAR.

Happy to put in an update - most wouldn't have a clue what I've been up too.


Left the Battalion in Jan 83. Then did another 11 yrs in Transport 88 - 97 as my hearing wouldn't allow me back to the Battalion.
